#### 10.2.33.2 Municipal Profile

##### *Population*

The Village's population during the 2010 census was reported at six hundred twelve (612) persons, marking a 14.2% increase over the 2000 census figure of five hundred thirty-six (536).

##### *Location*

The Village of Unionville is located within the Town of Minisink in the southwest portion of Orange County. The Village is bordered by New Jersey to the southwest and the surrounding Town of Minisink is bordered by the Towns of Warwick (southeast), Wawayanda (northeast), and Greenville (northwest).

##### *Brief History*

Founded in the 1700's, the Village was incorporated in 1871. Long prosperous as a result of the Middletown and Unionville railroad, the area was important for the transportation of agricultural goods (primarily dairy). With infrastructure advancements, however, the rail use declined. By 1968, passenger service was discontinued.

One of the smallest villages in New York State, the community is now best known as a bedroom community. The Appalachian Trail runs through the Village.

##### *Governing Body*

The Village is served by the elected Village Mayor and an elected four (4) trustee board.

### *Future Growth*

There are currently no plans for future growth within the Village. There are no large tracts of undeveloped property and there are no plans for redevelopment of existing parcels.

### 10.2.33.3 Hazard Vulnerabilities and Ranking

#### *Risk Ranking*

#### *Critical Facilities*

This information was used to identify potential needed improvements to existing critical facilities. Critical facilities were identified by the Village as meeting this definition: “Any structure(s) and/or infrastructure within a community whose incapacity or destruction would:

- Have a debilitating impact on the defense or economic security of that community.
- Significantly hinder a community’s ability to recover following a disaster.”

Discretion was left up to the participating jurisdiction to select these facilities.

**Priority Hazard Events**

The following sections detail the priority hazard events identified by the jurisdiction. Additional information about each hazard including frequency, history, and severity within Orange County is included within Section 5.0 of the main body of the Hazard Mitigation Plan (Volume I).

The probability of climate-related hazard events is generally expected to increase in the future within the Village of Unionville. This anticipated increase results from the expected increase in

weather volatility associated with climate change. The Village's location in the Wallkill River Watershed also contributes to increased flooding occurrences.

In the past ten (10) years there is no record of any extreme temperatures that have explicitly impacted the Village of Unionville. However, there have been a number of recorded occurrences within Orange County. The information can be found in the main body of the document.

*Severe Storm/Severe Thunderstorm*

For a description of these hazard, please see section 5.2.

Historical Occurrence:

In the past ten (10) years there is no record of any severe storm/severe thunderstorm that have explicitly impacted the Village of Unionville. However, there have been a number of recorded occurrences within Orange County. The information can be found in the main body of the document.

*Tornado*

While more common in the central plains states, southeast New York is considered among the highest risk for tornado occurrences. Damages are related to the high sustained winds and lightning events associated with these storms.

Historical Occurrence:

Since 1969, tornadoes have taken the lives of nine (9) people and caused more than \$28 million in damages in Orange County. One (1) tornado event has been recorded in the Village in the past ten (10) years.

**July 29, 2009** - Based on a damage survey conducted by the NWS Mount Holly, New Jersey Office in conjunction with the Orange County Office of Emergency Management, along with evidence from Doppler Weather Radar and photographs, it was confirmed that an EF0 tornado struck Unionville. Dozens of trees and a multitude of large tree branches fell across streets, and upon several houses and cars. This tornado was produced by the same severe thunderstorm that produced an EF2 tornado in Wantage New Jersey just minutes earlier during the afternoon on July 29.

*Hurricane/Coastal Storms*

Historical Occurrence:

In the past ten (10) years there is no record of any hurricanes that have explicitly impacted the Village of Unionville. However, there have been a number of recorded occurrences within Orange County. The information can be found in the main body of the document.

### *Drought*

#### Historical Occurrence:

In the past ten (10) years there is no record of any droughts that have explicitly impacted the Village of Unionville. However, there have been a number of recorded occurrences within Orange County. The information can be found in the main body of the document.

### *Landslides*

Landslides occur when a slope fails and moves downward due to gravity; this can be caused by anything that disrupts ground stability, from storms to acts of man. The New York State Geological Survey denotes areas with steep slopes and glacial lake clay soils as landslide vulnerable. While there are no areas within the Village of Unionville that meet these criteria, the village, has areas with steep slopes and ridgelines, these steep terrain areas are generally wooded, increasing the probability for a potential landslide in the future. However, the majority of the Village is located within “low incidence” for landslides.

In the past ten (10) years there is no record of any winter storms that have explicitly impacted the Village of Unionville. However, there have been a number of recorded occurrences within Orange County. The information can be found in the main body of the document.

*Ice Storm*

Historical Occurrence:

In the past ten (10) years there is no record of any ice storms that have explicitly impacted the Village of Unionville. However, there have been a number of recorded occurrences within Orange County. The information can be found in the main body of the document.

*Wildfire*

Wildfires can be caused by natural hazards (lightning) but are much more often manmade, either accidental in cause or arson. These most often occur during the summer, associated with the drier conditions which allow vegetation and brush to readily burn.

Historical Occurrence:

One of the major contributing factors to severity of wildfires depends on the presence of humans within areas where wildfires would typically occur. The Wildland/Urban Interface (WUI) is the area where houses and wildland vegetation meet. Housing developments alter the structure and function of forests. The 2014 Annual Report for the NYSDEC Division of Forest Protection

indicates that there were twenty-three (23) wildfires within Zone 3B which includes the Village of Unionville. These wildfires burnt a total of two hundred thirty-nine (239) acres; none of these wildfires were over one hundred (100) acres in size. The 2013 Annual Report for the NYSDEC Division of Forest Protection indicates that there were eleven (11) wildfires in Zone 3B that year. Two of these wildfires were over one hundred (100) acres in size, a total of 672.6 acres were burnt during wildfires during the 2013 wildfire season. The 2012 Annual Report for the NYSDEC Division of Forest Protection shows that there were seven (7) wildfires in Zone 3B that year. One (1) of these wildfires was over one hundred (100) acres in size with a total of 507.6 acres burning during wildfires in the 2012 wildfire season.

According to the 2011 Orange County Hazard Mitigation Plan, the Village of Unionville wildfire risk zone is 33%. No historical occurrences are noted with the Village.

While the affected areas are usually uninhabited, these events can have long term implications on the Village’s resources as well as discourage the tourism industry. As a relatively densely settled community, the Village of Unionville doesn’t have a significant amount of contiguous undeveloped land and thus, has a reduced likelihood of wildfire event occurrence.

*Ice Jam*

Historical Occurrence:

In the past ten (10) years there is no record of any ice jams that have explicitly impacted the Village of Unionville. However, there have been a number of recorded occurrences within Orange County. The information can be found in the main body of the document.

*NFIP: Administrator, Vulnerability, Resources, Compliance*

The Village (ID 360633) joined NFIP on June 28, 1974. As of January 31, 2018, there are a total of four (4) active policies, representing \$935,500 in value. According to Table 8.2c, there is one (1) repetitive flood loss property within the Village of Unionville. This property does not qualify as a severe flood loss property. More NFIP data can be found in Section 8.2.

The NFIP Administrator is the Building Inspector and the Village is considered to be in compliance. The Village has been maintaining NFIP participation by performing the duties and actions that were listed in the local laws that their municipal boards adopted. The Village Floodplain Administrator has been provided an NFIP best practices guidance package and will be using it to improve local participation in NFIP standards going forward. This package of documents was provided by NYSDHSES and can be found in Appendix F - NFIP Floodplain Administrator Guidance Package.

*Hazard Mitigation: Existing and Planning Mechanisms*

Emergency Communications, Routes, and Shelters:

Orange County utilizes the CodeRED Emergency Communications System. The Village of Unionville doesn't indicate a local emergency alerts system on its website.

The Village follows emergency route rules set by Orange County. The Village has two (2) designated emergency shelter locations: Unionville Fire Station (100 Rt. 284, Unionville, NY 10988) and Village Community Center (12-13 Main Street, Unionville, NY 10988). More information on these sites can be found in Attachment III.

Comprehensive Plan:

The Village of Unionville does not have a comprehensive plan. The Village Zoning Code was adopted in 1969.

Planning Mechanisms:

While this annex has provided a summary and description of existing plans, policies, and regulatory mechanisms that support hazard mitigation, the 2018 Orange County Hazard Mitigation Plan Update is intended to allow for the integration of its recommendations and data into local plans. 



**WHEREAS**, the Orange County Department of Emergency Services, with the assistance from Barton & Loguidice, D.P.C., has gathered information and prepared the Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan Update for Orange County, New York; and

**WHEREAS**, the Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan Update for Orange County, New York has been prepared in accordance with the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 and Title 44 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Part 201; and

**WHEREAS**, Title 44 CFR, Chapter 1, Part 201.6(c)(5) requires each local government participating in the preparation of a Multi-Jurisdictional Mitigation Plan or Plan Update to accept and adopt such plan; and

**WHEREAS**, the Village of Unionville, has reviewed the 2016 Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan Update for Orange County, has found the document to be acceptable, and as a local unit of government, has afforded its citizens an opportunity to comment and provide input regarding the Plan Update and the actions included in the Plan;

**WHEREAS**, the Village of Unionville, will consider the Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan Update for Orange County during the implementation and updating of local planning mechanisms, and will incorporate the hazard assessment data, hazard vulnerabilities, and mitigation actions in these mechanisms, where applicable;
